## ADJURNED OUT OF RESPECT

SENATE PASSED VARIOUS MEASURES THIS MORNING AND THEN ADJOURNED.

Three very strong petitions from school teachers of Hawaii against any change in the present school system were presented to the Senate today by Senator Dickey on behalf of the numerous signers of the petitions. All of the communications were referred to the County Committee.

Senator Wilcox offered a measure appropriating \$13,400 to repair and rebuild the road from Hanalei to Waihiha, including the culverts.

Senator McCandless presented a petition from numerous residents of Kailua asking that the electric lights be extended to the Fertilizer Works and the Kamehameha Road. It was referred to the committee on Public Lands.

Senate Bill 82 relating to the payment of the fire bonds was passed second reading on a verbal report by Senator C. Brown.

Bill No. 89 regarding the pay of witnesses was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means. The salary of the Registrar General was passed at \$900 instead of \$900. The Senate adjourned about 11 o'clock out of respect to the memory of the late Prince Albert Kuniakua.

## WHO KILLED JOSEPH PERRY?

PATRICK MURPHY FOREMAN OF SENATOR McCANDLESS' MAKUA RANCH CHARGED WITH CRIME.

Patrick Murphy foreman of Senator McCandless' ranch at Makua this island is at the police station to answer to a charge of murder. He is accused of having killed Joseph Perry a laborer on the same ranch yesterday. Yesterday afternoon after the cows had been milked and the milk sent to the city, Perry was sent to go over to Murphy's residence. No one but those men was present, so far as is now known. Shortly after Perry went toward the house a native man heard a shot fired. Evidently in the vicinity of the house. The native man went to the house to see the cause of the firing. He did not go immediately however fully fifteen minutes elapsed before he started for the place. He saw Perry's body lying in the road about twenty feet from the house. Within a short distance from the body was a mule, saddled and bridled and hitched to the fence. Murphy was at the house. The native inquired what had happened. Perry, Murphy is reported to have replied that the mule had kicked Perry and killed the laborer. There were blood stains on the head of Perry. The native man notified Deputy Sheriff Fernandez of the Ewa district. Murphy went to Waianae. Subsequently when the local police learned of the affair, Deputy High Sheriff Chillingworth issued instructions to have Murphy placed under arrest and on a special train went to Waianae last night accompanied by Dr. McDonald and others.

## Interference.

Financial Article No. 5.  
**DO**

**IF**
