## Pro-Vicar Libert Is Named As New Bishop

Ever since the death of the Bishop of Honolulu, the Catholic Church in these islands has been without a head. Of course, Pro-Vicar Libert, the next in rank to the dead prelate, has been handling the affairs of the church, expecting at every moment to get news of the new appointment to the exalted position.

It was therefore with the greatest satisfaction that the Mission received the news by cable at 9 o'clock this forenoon that the appointment had been made in accordance with the petition sent forward to Rome very soon after the death of the Bishop of Honolulu. Rev. Father Libert, pro-vicar, was mentioned as the appointee of the Pope, with jurisdiction over the Hawaiian Territory. Letters containing the full text of the appointment will follow later on and until that time will the real title of the new Bishop be known.

The appointment is a very popular one and is in accordance with the wishes of the Catholic clergy of the Hawaiian Islands. The new Bishop is a man of great force of character, universally beloved by all who know him, and success will undoubtedly come to the church under his administration.

Reverend Father Libert Bosnaens was born in 1857 in Antwerp, Belgium, and came to these islands in the same year when he was ordained priest in Louvain in 1881. His first mission was in Kauai, and in 1895 he was transferred to the mission of Wailuku, where he resided until the death of the late Bishop Gueltan. Last year he became an American citizen. His high education and his kind manners will make him a good subject for the position he is to occupy and the members of the Church in Hawaii may feel proud to have him as their spiritual superior.

## MURDER TRIAL MONDAY

**MOTION TO QUASH AND PLEA OF NOT GUILTY.**

**PAT MURPHY ARRAIGNED FOR KILLING JOE PERRY—CHICKEN THIEF CONVICTED. DIVORCE.**

Patrick Murphy, indicted for murder in the first degree, was arraigned before Judge Robinson this morning. The grand jury had found that with malice aforethought he killed Joe Perry at Makua, Oahu, on March 13 last. Robertson & Wilder and Henry Hogan appeared for the defendant. Deputy

Attorney General E. C. Peters prosecuting.

Mr. Robertson submitted without argument a motion to quash the indictment. Its grounds were those of illegality in drawing, summoning and empanelling of the grand jury, similar to those pending in the B. H. Wright embezzlement case from last term.

Judge Robinson denied the motion and counsel saved exceptions. Murphy was then called to the bar, where he answered to the usual question, he said, "Not guilty, Your Honor."

At the request of his counsel, the trial was specially set for Monday next, as many witnesses come from Waianae and it was desirable to save them a long wait in town.

Leo Joe pleaded not guilty to his indictment for extortion. Rivera, a stalwart young Porto Rican, pleaded not guilty to larceny in the second degree.

He was put on trial for larceny in the second degree, for stealing a chicken of the value of one dollar from Ho Ahoe. Deputy Attorney General Peters prosecuted, and H. W. Robinson defended the case. The following jury was sworn: F. E. King, John A. Noble, Samuel Kubeay, A. H. R. Vieira, J. W. Chapman, Joseph Luahua, Joseph Ricard, W. D. Hamilton, J. J. Hogan, A. Q. Macdonald, George K. Fox and George K. Kala. They retired about noon and returned within half an hour with a verdict of guilty. Defendant was sentenced to pay a fine of \$25 and costs.

Another alleged chicken thief came up for trial this afternoon. This is Leo Joe, who by the indictment would seem to be a wholesaler in his line, being charged with stealing seven roosters and six hens of the aggregate value of \$9.75.

Joanquin Silva, charged with peddling Louisiana lottery tickets, was found not guilty by the jury last night.

## COOPER PRESIDENT NEW HEALTH BOARD

Final Appointments Are Confirmed by Senate Today.

## BATHING BEACH PROPOSED FOR THE KAPOLANI PARK

APPROPRIATION ITEMS INTERRUPTED BY LIVELY DISCUSSION ON BOARD OF HEALTH.

Extra Session. Eleventh Day.

Senator McCandless presented a report of the Public Lands Committee on investigation of the needs of Kapiolani Park Commission, recommending an appropriation of \$24,000 for the ensuing biennial period. An itemized statement of the objects of the appropriation was given. The payroll amounts to \$9,648. As to the requisition for \$7,500 for boring an artesian well and piping therefrom through the park, the committee leaves it to the consideration of the Senate.

## Public Bathing Ground.

In conclusion the committee says: "The Superintendent of Public Works has informed your committee that there are several lots, fronting on beach, that have not yet been disposed of by the Government, except under lease. Your committee would recommend that these lots be sold by the Government and that the Commissioners be requested to ascertain what the leases could be bought for and to report to the next Legislature, with a view to reserving the same for the purpose of making them a Territorial free public bathing ground."

Signed by L. L. McFadden, J. D. Paris and J. B. Kachel.

The report was adopted.

Senator Cecil Brown stated that when the bill was under consideration he would move to insert an item of \$7,500 for the artesian well.

Senator Achi said the price of the artesian well was too high. He had two wells bored at a less rate. Yes, the water was good.

The bill appropriating salaries and pay rolls for eighteen months from January 1, 1904, to June 30, 1905, was resumed on second reading.

Senator Cecil Brown had the salary of supervising engineer, Public Works Department, reconsidered to make it \$4,500 as in the original bill. It was the same office as that of Assistant Superintendent which had been abolished in name. The voting of \$4,000 yesterday was a mistake.

Clerks of the Board of Health at \$2,500 were considered where the reading ended yesterday. Senator Achi proposed instead of the lump, one clerk at \$1,800 and two at \$900 each, which after a good deal of talk was adopted.

On the item of \$2,000 for inspector of plumbing and house sewers, Senator Achi moved to make it \$3,150.

President Crable remarked that this was decreasing the pay as the work of the office increased with extension of sewers.

Senator McCandless heatedly declared this a mistake. It was not.

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## Why House Members ARE SHYING At \$20,000 Item

It has been learned that the secret of the real opposition to the item of \$20,000 as brought into the House by Mr. Harris in the form of a resolution and referred to a committee of three, lies in the fact that it is proposed that the advertising of Hawaii and the consequent expenditure of the money shall come under the direct control of the Secretary of the Territory, should the amount be inserted in the bill according to the terms of the resolution.

For such reason or other, this does not seem to meet with the approval of the majority of the members of the lower house, and the matter was brought to light by the amendment proposed on the part of one of the representatives to have the money in charge of a commissioner whose duty it would be to attend to the whole question of advertising the country. In this way it is thought by the members who shy at the item on account of its ultimate destiny, that there will be a strict attention to the business in hand and the editorial matter that goes abroad will not cast the shadows of any Government officer.

It is further thought by those members who shied this morning that the Secretary of the Territory is really too busy to be able to superintend the work of advertising the islands, a matter which requires clear and unbiased thought and plenty of it. Advertising Hawaii is looked upon as a non-political venture—something that shall represent the islands and the various components that go to make up the population of the country, just as they are.

The native members are afraid of a continuation of the old methods such as those which were flouted before the American public in 1893 by Lorria A. Thurston, when it was considered, perhaps conscientiously, that the way to attract tourists was by having the hula danced in public by native women with scant raiment. They have had enough of this kind of thing and they want to be sure before appropriating any money that there will be at the head of affairs, a man or men who will represent Hawaii as it is instead of magnifying the bad and minimizing the good.

A proposition was advanced this morning by one of the members of the house to the effect that there be one clerk chosen from the Chamber of Commerce, the Merchants' Association and the Builders and Traders' Exchange, subject to the approval of the Governor, who shall act as a tourist committee into whose hands the money appropriated by the Legislature shall be paid, this committee to attend to all of the work of advertising of Hawaii. It is presumed that this committee will serve without compensation, since it is to the advantage of the merchants and other doing business in the Territory that there shall be an influx of tourists from the Mainland. The member stated that he would rather trust to the discretion of three businessmen than the interested interest of a very busy official.

## HOUSE TALKS ON ADVERTISEMENT

Hawaii's Needs In This Line Are Well Aired.

## AYLETT TELLS OF HOW THURSTON DID TRICK

KANIHIO SAYS ISLANDS ARE WELL ENOUGH KNOWN—REPORT OF COMMITTEE REJECTED.

HOUSE. Extra Session. Eleventh Day.

Speaker Beckley announced that this was the eleventh day of the session and Mr. Jaeger had not put in an appearance. On motion of Mr. Knudsen, the clerk was requested to send a letter to Mr. Jaeger requesting his presence in the House.

A resolution by Mr. Kealawa providing \$40 month for the keeper of Emma Square, was taken up on the table to be considered with the Appropriation Bill.

Tourist Travel Again.

The report of the committee on the \$20,000 appropriation for advertising Hawaii, which was brought into the House in the shape of a resolution, was taken up and read again.

Mr. Aylett proposed an amendment, making the amount \$12,000 instead of \$20,000. Mr. Vida moved to amend to the effect that a tourist commissioner be appointed to take charge of all the advertising. Mr. Fernandez moved to throw out the item. He stated that if the money was for a Government printing house he would support the item.

Mr. Aylett said the time had come when the statements made by the missionaries about the Hawaiians were still uncivilized and savage, and he moved to amend to the effect that it was to be done to do it was to appropriate money to send proper advertising material abroad. He referred to the nature of advertising of Hawaii which Lorria A. Thurston had initiated, that of showing Hawaiian women with bare breasts. He could not blame Mr. Thurston very greatly since he was looking to the welfare of his own pocket. It was time that the placing of the Hawaiians before the people of foreign countries as naked cannibals was stopped. Thought He Was a Cannibal.

Mr. Aylett said he had had a very nice little experience once when he was driving a hack. He had tried to get some Americans from the Mainland to take his carriage while they were sojourning in the city. They were afraid to ride with him because they thought he was a savage.

The missionaries were to blame for the false impressions that had gotten abroad with reference to the Hawaiian people. However, they were out after the money and nothing else mattered.

He served as literary editor of the New York World and later of the New York Mail and Express.

## Tetuan Reign of Terror
